Second Reading - Gospel: Mark 10:46-52

A reading from the Holy Gospel attributed to Mark:

Jesus, and a throng of followers on "the Way" to Jerusalem, came to Jericho. As Jesus and his disciples, together with the parade of people, were leaving the city, Bartimaeus (which means "son of Timaeus"), who was blind, was sitting by the wayside begging.

When he heard that it was Jesus of Nazareth, he began to shout, "Jesus, Heir of David, have mercy on me!" Many rebuked him and told him to be quiet. He shouted all the more, "Heir of David, have mercy on me!"

Jesus stopped and said, "Call him."

So, they called to the blind man, "Come now! On your feet! He's calling you." Throwing off his cloak, Bartimaeus jumped to his feet and came to Jesus.

"What do you want me to do for you?" Jesus asked him. Bartimaeus replied, "Rabbi, I want to see."

"Go," said Jesus, "your faith has healed you." Immediately, Bartimaeus received his sight and followed Jesus along "the Way."

The inspired words attributed to the evangelist, Mark. Amen.

Third Reading: Excerpt from *Everything Belongs: The Gift of Contemplative Prayer* A reading from the writings of Richard Rohr:

Spirituality is about seeing. It's not about earning or achieving. It's about relationship rather than results or requirements. Once you see, the rest follows. You don't need to push the river, because you are in it. The life is lived within us, and we learn how to say yes to that life. If we exist on a level where we can see how "everything belongs," we can we trust the flow and trust the life, the life so large and deep and spacious that it even includes its opposite, death. We must do this, because it is the only life available to us.

Shared Homily: Nancy Tondy

Once again, we gather in incredibly challenging times, with savage wars in the background, the brutal aftermath of climate-change disaster, and the constant din of political discourse that's gone from vitriolic to vulgar. Our collective pain is unrelenting. And in our first reading, Jeremiah is speaking to another group of people whose collective pain is unrelenting. The prophet proclaims a future

when the people will sing for joy, emphasizing that those who will return rejoicing include the most vulnerable, people with physical disabilities or who are pregnant or in labor. They, who are utterly dependent upon God, will be led "beside flowing streams on a way that has been cleared."

Jeremiah specifically mentions the blind. Today, we know that the visually impaired can see in ways that the sighted cannot. Research shows this; history shows it. In 1933, Helen Keller, blind and deaf before the age of two, described how she encountered the miracles of nature while walking through the woods. How she felt the delicate symmetry of a leaf; the smooth skin of a silver birch; the velvety texture of a flower; the cool waters of a brook rushing through her open fingers. Keller's life accomplishments prove that her memory, language processing, and sensory motor function were advanced—well beyond the abilities of people with typical eyesight.

The scene in our Gospel includes throngs of followers along with the disciples. But of all these many characters, it is the blind beggar, Bartimaeus, who sees most clearly. He alone recognizes Jesus as the "Heir of David." Above the objections of others, the intrepid Bartimaeus calls out to connect with Jesus. Bartimaeus, who is utterly dependent upon God, is willing to risk that Jesus can restore his physical sight. Yet, with his profound faith, *Bartimaeus already sees* better than most.

In last week's Gospel, Jesus asks his disciples the same question we hear today, "What do you want me to do for you?" And they immediately attempt to secure their places of privilege on the right and on the left of Jesus. Bartimaeus has a different answer. "I want to see," he says. This is the heart cry of people of faith: to see in the way that Jesus sees. To see beyond our privileges, our biases, our cultures of domination and resistance. When Jesus reaches out to Bartimaeus, He is bringing him to the center and inviting us to do the same.

If we believe that "Spirituality is about seeing" and "not about earning or achieving," that it's "about relationship rather than results or requirements," then always, especially in our collective pain, let our prayer be this: We want to see. Make us seekers and searchers of your Great Mystery, reaching out to one another to create the life Jeremiah describes, the life Jesus describes—a life where everyone belongs, where your people are gathered from the farthest reaches of the earth and return weeping for joy.

Sign of Peace

As we prepare this sacred meal, we reaffirm that, just as Jesus was anointed, so is each of us. And so, we celebrate our Creator's fruitful love as we extend our blessing to one another with joy. May the peace that our brother Jesus offers be always with us!

Offertory (All raise bread and cup)

We place on our plate the harvest to be won by labor's love. And into the cup we pour all the sap which is to be pressed out this day from the Earth's fruits.

Prayer Over the Gifts

ALL: O Gracious One, giver of the gifts we bring, receive them from your church gathered here today, affirming the sacrament of your Presence among us. Amen.

The Holy One is with us, abounding in Love!

- **1.** Giving thanks to the Source of All Life, we open our hearts in the name of Jesus, who lives and loves, heals and empowers, through us.
- **2.** We praise you, O God of wonder and life, as we celebrate Jesus' life and ministry, a witness to the life of compassion and love we are all called to live. We lift up our hearts with all the saints and angels:

- **4.** Sending among us Jesus, our Light and Hope, you birth afresh in our world the power of Sophia Wisdom, and in the gift of the Spirit, your creative goodness blooms anew, amid the variety and wonder of life.

ALL: Spirit of Life, all that exists is blessed and enlivened by your presence. May these gifts of bread and fruit of the vine, and our very lives, be the nourishment we need to sustain us.

5. As a Christian people we celebrate the Open Table, proclaimed by Jesus our liberator and our friend, a Table of abundant life, inclusive love, and liberation, where all are welcome, and from which no one is to be excluded.

At this gathering, we take bread, as Jesus took bread, and we remember, as Jesus remembered, the constant presence of the Spirit of Life and Love. And Jesus offers it to us now, saying: (All raise bread)

ALL: Take and eat, all of you. This is my Self, the Bread of Life which I give to strengthen you.

Jesus then raised a cup of blessing, spoke the grace, and offers it to us now, saying: (All raise cup)

ALL: Take and drink this Cup of Life, the Covenant made new again through my life in you. Whenever you remember me like this, I am among you.

We give thanks for who we are in Christ:

ALL: Matter becomes conscious, the universe coming to reflect on itself, earthen vessels that hold a treasure, temple of God's Spirit, the Body of Christ.

(All raise bread and cup)

ALL: For it is through learning to live as Jesus lived,

And why he lived,

And for whom he lived,

That we awaken to your Spirit within,

Moving us to worship you truly,

Life-giving God,

At this time, and all time, and in all ways.

Cantor: Amen!

Communion Rite

We pray as these gifts are shared among us:

- **6.** Loving God, you call us to live the Gospel of peace and justice. *We will live justly.*
- **7.** Loving God, you call us to be your presence in the world. *We will love tenderly.*
- **1.** Loving God, you call us to speak truth to power. We will walk with integrity in your presence.

(Presider raises bread and cup)

This is the Bread and Cup of Life, through which we are nourished, and we nourish one another.

ALL: We receive this bread and fruit of the vine as the presence of Christ among us!
